DIRECTOR'S REPORT *Erik Keisler, Executive Director*

Beaver Creek is back to our new normal! I cannot believe the amount of programs, camps, field trips and visitors that we had this last year. We have surpassed records for attendance at special events, daily visitorship, camps, and programs. As a social butterfly, I love to have people here at Beaver Creek, so this increase has truly made my heart flutter! I feel like the more people engaged at Beaver Creek, the more people that are truly experiencing our mission of connecting people with nature.

Last fall, we received two grants from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) which was awarded to Eau Claire County non-profits. We have been able to apply and match those funds for multiple projects at Beaver Creek. The Friends Board felt that we should apply those dollars to programs, for the most part, and we have been busy using those dollars to great use. Since receiving those funds, we have been busy completing projects that have been highly prioritized since the pandemic.



• We have a new turtle tank for our snapping turtle, "Snapper" who has already out grown two tanks. This new tank will be installed this winter for a total cost of \$30,000 using ARPA funds and a matching grant from the Eau Claire Community Foundation. We are still raising additional funds to help cover the final costs of the tank.

• We now have new ADA accessible doors for the Wise Nature Center. This includes the front doors and lower level exit door leading to the Butterfly House and Nature Nooks. The total cost for this project was \$15,000.



• We have a new Wellness Room located in the lower level near the base of the tree. This room is to be used for administering medicines for guests or a space for nursing mothers so they can sit in comfort and watch the birds at the feeders. The total cost for this project was \$10,000, and ARPA funds were matched by a grant from the Nordson Foundation.

• Our security system has been updated! There is a new keyless entry pad on the Nature Center, Main Lodge, Beaver Den Conference Center and garage, and maintenance garage. We also installed new security cameras located around the Beaver Creek campus. The total cost for this project was \$50,000. • Water spigots were installed around our Nature Center flower gardens and inside the greenhouse to help maintain our native plants and increase efficiency for our largest fundraiser, the Native Plant Sale. The total cost for this project was \$4,000.



• Our greenhouse received another update with a new furnace and thermostat so we can better manage the heat inside while growing our native plants. The total cost for this project was \$2,000.



• The Wise Nature Center also received an upgrade! Our lobby is looking sharp with a new whiteboard calendar that displays all our upcoming programs and events, as well as phenological happenings. We also hung up new photos and signs to improve the space. The total cost for this project was \$2,500.

• An Eagle Scout also built us new picnic tables for the Outdoor Classroom! The space now has a fan to help circulate airflow for field trips. The total cost for this project was \$2,500.

• We added more AmeriCorps members to the Beaver Creek team to assist the Education, Marketing, and Citizen Science departments. This in turn has allowed us to welcome more students for field trips than ever before, and increase capacity building in the other areas. The total cost for this addition was \$20,000.



• And finally, we ordered and added new elements to update the Obstacle Course and Nature Nooks. The total cost for this project was \$20,000, and ARPA funds were matched by grants from the Green Bay Packers Foundation and donations from Sawyer Strong.

Investing in Beaver Creek during a time when we have gotten so busy has been very fruitful. Guests who have revisited after the pandemic have been very happy with the changes that took place the last few years. Visitors see that we have been able to invest in this valuable community resource thanks to the support of our Friends, members, volunteers, donors, and staff.

You don't have to take my word for it... but if you look at the stats at the end of this report, you will see just how much our renewed and new memberships have increased. With the reopening of the Children's Museum of Eau Claire, the community took advantage of the Triple Play Membership and we welcomed hundreds of new families to Beaver Creek. This membership is in partnership with the Children's Museum, Chippewa Valley Museum, and Beaver Creek Reserve. Triple Play used to have the membership lowest rate. but with our success and the successes of our partners, we have seen a huge spike in new members which exposes new people to Beaver Creek and helps us continue our mission!

As far as where we are now. attendance during the Butterfly House season increased 40%, summer camps served an additional 30% more youth, and we sold more native plants than ever before during our Native Plant Sale. Beaver Creek staff and AmeriCorps members have been working diligently to increase our organization's capacity

to the community. To even better serve our community, we have increased the number of AmeriCorps members we host from one individual back in 2016 (AJ Leiden) to six full time members for the 2023-2024 season. We are serving so many more people while great opportunities giving for these members to grow professionally and advance our mission. Our Friends Board set this as a strategic goal to help our people of Beaver Creek: staff, volunteers, members, and donors. It's exciting to see the impact our staff and volunteers have on the organization and community as a whole, and that donors know their dollars are being put to good use.

Thanks to all the people who helped make last year a success. I can't wait to see how we will continue to connect people with nature next year!

NOTES FROM OUR NATURALISTS Megan Giefer & John Muetz

2022-2023 was an exciting year for the education team! So much has happened across all facets of what we do here at Beaver Creek Reserve.



Field Trips

We took some time during the pandemic and revamped our field trips by modifying all lessons to be taught outdoors. Because of the positive feedback from schools and teachers. we've continued to emphasize the learning experiences taught completely outdoors! In 2022, Beaver Creek saw 2,560 students explore and discover the Nature Center, Youth Camp, and trails. We had a great team of WisCorps members that assisted and led field trips this past year. Because we have invested in an experienced teaching staff to lead all lessons, teachers were able to enjoy their time at Beaver Creek while learning along with their students. Some of the activities included. stream study, orienteering, outdoor survival, archery. animal signs hikes, live animals, and more!

Summer Camps

Starting in the summer of 2022, we overhauled the way we run summer camps and doubled the number of available spots for campers by running both a morning and afternoon session! With our contract with the Eau Claire Area School District and the excitement from the community, we were able to reach almost 700 students in 2022! With the high demand for summer programming, we decided to expand our camp offerings once again in 2023 and added the School District of Altoona, and the Augusta Area School District to our partnering schools, allowing us to provide DPI subsidized camp opportunities to a wider range of students in the valley.



Trails Updates

We were active on our trails in 2022 from fires, to art, and even blazing an old trail. In May, we conducted a controlled burn of the oak savannah along the south green loop under the instruction of Jim Schwiebert. In September, local artist Terry Meyer erected a stunning sculpture of a nesting Redshouldered Hawk which can be seen towering over the oak savannah at the southernmost confluence of the red, yellow and green trails. As summer camps began to ramp up, the education team took to the trails and revitalized the overgrown trail connecting us to Big Falls County Park. This winding trail is now equipped with white trail markers to auide hikers between the two properties.

Displays and Animal Ambassadors With grant funding through the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), we hired two professional assessors conduct а Collections to Assessment for Preservation. resulting in a detailed report on our preservation needs and standards, and ensuring the longevity of our buildings, displavs. and interpretive materials. One great example of how these new standards have been utilized to improve our displays is the purchase of our new snapping turtle enclosure! This tank will meet the current standards set by zoo and aquarium associations. We were able to raise enough money through grant funding and donations to move forward on providing Snapper with a new 360 gallon tank. This will sextuple the amount of livable space for him for future growth!



Butterfly House

Our Butterfly House also had a great season welcoming more visitors than we have ever seen before! In 2022, the House had 6,037 visitors walk through the doors and experience all stages of Wisconsin-native butterflies. We also ran several Butterfly Camps for grades K-5, and put up three billboards around Eau Claire County promoting the Butterfly House and all there is to explore.

CITIZEN SCIENCE CENTER REPORT Jeanette Kelly, Citizen Science & Education Director

Another exciting year at the Citizen Science Center, with new staff and new projects!

Lia Landowski, our Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator. took a job with the Army Corps of Engineers in Idaho. Before she left, we hired Bre Klockzien to fill her shoes. We made a really good choice! Bre has jumped into this position and has been making a huge splash. She has been forming new partnerships encouraging interest. developing outreach. and stretching our boundaries to bring new ideas to the Citizen Science Center. Bre has not hesitated to get involved with all things Beaver Creek Reserve. She's accomplished all of this while working on her Master's Degree. During the past few months. Bre also worked to complete Aquatic Invasive Species surveys on 14 different water bodies, worked with 13 citizen lake monitors, trained five watercraft inspectors for the Clean Boats. Clean Waters program, and worked with 14 lake groups.



Besides the work completed for the Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator part of her position, Bre also manages two citizen science programs: Acoustic Bat Monitoring and Mussel Monitoring of Eau Claire County Phase II. With help from our amazing volunteers, we were able to



survey 4 areas throughout the summer for our Acoustic Bat Monitoring program and assist in a graduate project, Bats in Small Cities. The Mussel Monitoring program worked to educate, raise awareness, and monitor 49 streams for freshwater mussel abundance and distribution throughout Eau Claire County rivers and streams.

This past September, we welcomed our new AmeriCorps members. Luke Trittelwitz, a recent graduate from UW-Stevens Point, will spend the next year working as our Avian Field Technician. Two of our new projects finally got underway this year and Luke was able to be part of both of them.

A grant from Xcel Energy and CD Besdany allowed us to start up a new American Kestrel Host project. We recruited five property owners to put up Kestrel nest boxes on their properties. The host then monitored their box through the nesting season, hoping a pair of Kestrels would take up residency... and we had success! One of our hosts had a successful Kestrel nest that produced two male and two female, healthy and well-fed Kestrel fledglings. We will continue this project next year and hope to add some additional Kestrel Hosts.

We also erected our motus towers! You have likely heard



us talking about these towers for the last year or so. This summer we installed a motus tower at Henke Acres Research Site and another on top of the Wise Nature Center. Motus is a wildlife tracking technology that uses radio signal towers track migrating birds. to Transmitter tags are placed on migrating birds and when the bird flies within 15 km of a tracking tower, the tower detects and records the signal from the tag. Data is submitted to an international database that keeps track of all tagged birds' information. The Chippewa Valley is an essential area for migration, given our proximity to both the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River flyways. We also serve as a critical migration conduit to the sub-boreal forest located north of us. As I am writing this, we have not received our first "ping" on a bird tag yet. Keep watching for updated information!

Thank you for the support this past year volunteering as citizen scientists, participating in our programming, and providing monetary support. It is exciting that even after almost 20 years, the Citizen Science Center can continue to find ways to grow and engage our community.







per Department (both virtual & in-person)




Number of Programs Offered per Department (both virtual & in-person)


