We want to thank all the volunteers who took time out of their day to work in the butterfly lab and in the butterfly house. Without them we couldn't be this successful! We had a total of 35 different species in the butterfly house this season, some Swallowtail, Tiger Vicory, including: Mourning Cloak, Red Spotted Purple, Mustard White, Silver Bordered Fritillary, and so much more!
